

- Over 18,000 pounds of scrap tires were used to create over 360,000 pounds of rubber used in the new artificial turf at Mosaic Stadium.
- The tires were processed at the Permalife plant in Assiniboia and a Montreal-based company, FieldTurf, installed the new surface at Mosaic Stadium.
- This unique system has been used all over the world and can be found in four other CFL stadiums including the British Columbia Lions, Calgary Stampeders, Montreal Alouettes, and the Toronto Argonauts.

- The Saskatchewan Scrap Tire Corporation (SSTC) is a non-profit, industry-led association that manages and delivers the province-wide tire recycling program.
- This program has been responsible for the collection of 8,000,000 used tires from tire retailer sites and municipal landfills since its inception in 1996.
- These actions have diverted over 32 million pounds of scrap rubber from the Saskatchewan waste stream, turning it back into environmentally friendly products such as playground equipment, truck bed liners, livestock feeders, interlocking patio and paving bricks, vehicle ramps, planters, mats and a lot more. It can be found everywhere from the roads and streets we drive on to sports fields in our communities.
- The activities undertaken as part of the program are funded entirely through the tire recycling fee that is levied on the purchase of new tires.
- Over 1,200 tire retailers collect and remit the fee to the SSTC, which uses the funds to pay incentives to private companies that collect process and recycle scrap tires.
